

Meet your Wardens...



Captain Nigel Palmer OBE *Provincial Senior Grand Warden*

Nigel was born in Middlesex in 1951 but grew up in Herefordshire and Suffolk before going to sea as a Cadet at the age of 16, this was followed by 17 years at sea in the Merchant Navy achieving command in 1984. The next 20 years were spent in shipping management with 7 years living in



Japan and Australia. Another 11 years as Chairman of a major global marine insurer kept the shipping connection alive along with roles in maritime training.

Nigel is an Elder Brother of Trinity House and continues to be actively engaged with the maritime sector today. He is Chairman of the Shipwrecked Fishermen and Mariners' Royal Benevolent Society and Patron of the East Anglian Sailing Trust. He was appointed OBE in 1989 for services to the shipping industry.

Nigel married Sandra in 1984 and they have three adult children and one grandson. They live in Felixstowe in an old thatched house that always seems to have something to be repaired or renovated. Gardening and membership of the Sailing and Golf Clubs provide leisure opportunities.

Nigel's Father and Grandfather were both Masons and he was initiated into Felix Lodge No. 2371 in 1984. Progression was interrupted by periods abroad, but he finally had the privilege of being Worshipful Master of his Mother Lodge in 2009/10. Nigel has been Lodge Secretary since 2018, so it will be a busy year juggling this with Provincial duties. He is also a member of Chapter, Mark, Royal Ark Mariners and Rose Croix.

Whilst living and working abroad the universal nature of Masonry became apparent with visits to Lodges in Japan, Singapore and Australia. Felix Lodge No. 2371 is twinned with Lodge Vembanad No. 319 (Grand Lodge of India) and Nigel was able to visit them in 2017 whilst on holiday in Kerala and participate in that evening's ceremony. Masonry has come to form an increasingly important part of life and appointment as Provincial Senior Grand Warden represents an incredible (and unexpected) honour - he is looking forward to visiting Lodges throughout the Province during his year of office.



Mark Hawes Provincial Junior Grand Warden

Mark was born in Cambridge, moving to Southern Ireland when he was three due to his fathers work and returning to settle with the family in Kessingland at the age of seven. Having finished school at the Sir John Leman High in Beccles he joined Barclays Bank in 1978 as the office junior based in Loddon. His career with the Bank lasted 43-years before he decided to retire in May of 2021, purely to explore other options for his time.



He was extremely fortunate to spend his whole banking career within Norfolk and Suffolk with the last 11-years as an Agricultural Manager looking after purely farming clients but it was during his 20-years as a Local Business Manager based in Southwold that masonry entered his life. Moving professionally to Southwold in 1989, having spent the previous 6-years in Great Yarmouth, he initially joined the local Rotary club and perhaps not unexpectedly ended up as Treasurer for 5-years. It was during a particular business conversation with WBro Brian Duncan that the subject of masonry came up which led to Mark being proposed and seconded by WBro Brian and Brian's late father WBro Mungo. Mark was initiated into Martyn Lodge in Southwold in 1994, became Master in 2002 and for the last 5-years has held the office of Lodge Mentor.

Outside of lodge, Mark celebrates 40-years of marriage in September of this year with Sharon. Together they have two daughters and two granddaughters which occupy a lovely part of their time.

From a very early age Mark has always had a passion for sport, playing most from school age and for 6-years in the mid to late eighties he ran a very successful local football team. The full circle of Freemasonry

Freemasonry, is by nature, a continuous cycle, a "Living Circle". In love, wisdom, fraternity, and charity, Stour Valley Lodge No. 1224 placed the tail firmly in the in mouth of the province of Suffolk, if you know your allegory, to form the perfect circle in the masonic progression of their very own Provincial Grand Master Right Worshipful Brother Ian John Yeldham. It was with splendid care and planning that the evening unfolded and the details of our PGM's initiation were revisited and carefully stitched to the coat tails of what would be his final Provincial Grand Lodge meeting only ten days later.

Brethren from across our province tendered their generous blind bids in a ballot to perform the various offices and ritual for the evening. The ceremony was conducted with a care and polish that took even our



candidate by surprise, particularly when the secretary came out of the temple to receive the fees for initiation. With several lifetimes of masonic experience at work on the temple floor that night, the contrast of light and shade of the squared pavement was matched by the work of the Junior Warden for the evening, an office performed by a master mason as his very first attempt at masonic workings since his own initiation and a faultless performance indeed. In the bar afterwards, the candidate what heard to say when the blindfold was removed, "I was surprised to see so many of my friends were masons!"

SLB Royal Arch Red Table

On 28th April, the Suffolk Light Blues, in conjunction with Suffolk Provincial Grand Chapter, organised a Red Table event for local masons to find out more about the Royal Arch – the completion of pure antient masonry. Members of both the Craft and Royal Arch Provincial Teams explained the history and story of the degree, along with the practical logistics of being a member of a Chapter, before members of

This could not have been more appropriately proposed than by Ian's great friend and Past Deputy Provincial Grand Master, Very Worshipful Brother John Rice. The combination of personal memories, research from the lodge minute books and a copy of the hand written table plan from the festive board of 17th May 1985, made the evening complete. The end result, a team of brethren with something very unusual to add to their masonic CV's and a Provincial Grand Master, genuinely taken by surprise at an evening of Freemasonry, charged with emotion and spent in the company of his mother lodge.

An introduction to Jolyon Berry our PGM and MEGS Designate...

Jolyon Berry is originally from Kent. He went to school in London and was based in Germany while serving in the Army. After his military service, he read law at Nottingham University. It was as an undergraduate in 1996 that he was initiated into Westminster & Keystone Lodge No.10 by the then VWBro Cmdr Michael Higham, Grand Secretary.

At Dulwich College, Jolyon enjoyed playing rugby but fell short of ever making it to the 1XV. More sporty than academic, he evaded questions about university ambitions by stating an intention to join the Royal Military Academy Sandhurst. Satisfied with this response, his schoolmasters left him alone and he ended up at Sandhurst in January 1990 straight after A Levels and just after a cycling accident which resulted in a nasty injury near his right eye, necessitating plastic surgery. Jolyon was commissioned into the Royal Tank Regiment aged 19.

Jolyon had planned to serve a short service commission which would have enabled him to avoid university while still being able to get a 'real job' when he left the Army at about the same time as his classmates who had decided to get degrees. However, he had no career path in mind, a recession was about to start in 1994 and the redundancy of many Army Officers at about the same time further to 'Options for Change' meant that being an Army Officer was not going to help much in a competitive job market. And, while he could strip and reassemble the main armament of a Challenger tank, his CV was still that of a quite good rugby player. So, at the age of 23, all apprehension about academic learning was set aside as he resolved to apply to university. With some luck and a lot of soldiers' cheek

and bluff, he managed to persuade the powers-that-be to allow him to sit an entrance test to read law at Nottingham University. From a cohort of well over 100 applicants, six would be selected to be accepted as mature law students. Shortly before that test he worked as a solicitors' clerk assisting counsel through a particularly long and boring fraud trial during which the barristers argued daily about whether the evidence about to be heard was, or was not 'hearsay'. To his delight, the only question on the University entrance paper was about the law of hearsay!

During his year at law school, Jolyon met Gayle, to whom he was married for 20 years. He qualified as a solicitor in the Employment, Pensions, and Incentives team at Allen & Overy in London and by 2003 two of their three children had arrived. This prompted a move from central London to Colchester and shortly after Jolyon moved jobs and began working as a solicitor in Ipswich for Birketts LLP.

It was during his first week at Birketts that Jolyon was approached by WBro Jeremy Bristol, a senior partner at the firm, who introduced himself with the words 'I understand you are a Freemason', inviting him to a meeting at British Union No.114; his first introduction to Suffolk masonry. There he was introduced to the idea of joining the newly formed Laconic Lodge No. 9771, which he joined in 2006 becoming Worshipful Master ten years later.

In 2010, Jolyon was exalted into Westminster & Keystone Royal Arch Chapter No.10. He became an active Grand Officer in 2016, serving as an Assistant Grand Registrar for a year before being appointed Suffolk's Provincial Grand Registrar in 2017. In 2019, Companion Jolyon was a founder member of Sparta Chapter No. 9771 of which he is currently Haggai. He is a member of Philip Jervis Kay Lodge No. 9300 and the 'red apron' Old Union Lodge No.46. Until this year he was both DC of No.10, and the Secretary of Laconic. He is proud to be a member of the Anglia Chapter of the Widows Sons Masonic Bikers Association but does not get to ride out as often as he'd like.

Jolyon's involvement in Freemasonry extends beyond his lodges and chapters. He is a member of the UGLE Masonic Appeals Court and a trustee of the Freemasons Fund for Surgical Research, formerly known as the 250th Charity.

Although Freemasonry occupies a significant place in Jolyon's life, he has many other interests and commitments. During 'lockdown', while residing in his bachelor pad in Wivenhoe, he got into the habit of picking up litter during his daily dog walks. This inspired the creation of the Facebook group 'the Wombles of Wivenhoe' which in turn led to him contacting the CEO of Wombles Operations Limited, the company that owns the global intellectual property rights for the original Wombles. The pair met, got on well and they soon agreed to form a new, national charity; the Wombles Community Charity which came into being in March 2023. Its aims are to support community litter picking groups and to assist educating primary school children about environmental matters. Brother Jolyon is its Chairman and most days he still picks litter while walking Cosmo the doa.

Although Jolyon's days of playing rugby are behind him, he tries to keep fit as a member of the men's crew that rows the coastal gig 'Defiance' for the Wivenhoe Corsairs Rowing Club and every year he and an old army friend go on a European motorbike tour; last year to Norway.

At work, Jolyon is an Executive Committee member and a director of Thompson Smith and Puxon in Colchester. He specialises in advising businesses about employment matters. He has lived in Wivenhoe for over 18 years and remains nearby Gayle and their children, Emily, Xavier and Caspar. His partner, Bettina, is Austrian. Although she has lived in the UK for over 15 years, she has only recently been introduced to Freemasonry!

Masonic Visiting Overseas

With summer holidays in and out of Suffolk now being planned and masonic travel following in the slipstream of those plans, we thought it might be timely for Forum Newsletter to give a short overview on the subject. Also, some pointers, which will underline the advice given in the "Information for Guidance of Members of the Craft", of which every brother has a copy, given to him by his lodge... somewhere!

With well over 200 Grand Lodges recognised by UGLE as being regular, or acceptable to visit, there are a lot of options open to masonic travellers and that is in addition to UGLE's own lodges, spread around the world. It is interesting to note that each Grand Lodge recognised by UGLE has their own procedure on visiting and whilst they are nearly always welcoming, each is different and has its own "sovereign" rules. Some are more formal than we are in their procedures, but many of their Brethren will be ignorant of their rules and perhaps likely to offer invitations than can embarrass them when the unintentional error becomes known...

More of our brethren than ever are taking the opportunity whilst away on holiday to have an 'evening off' from the family to visit a local lodge under a recognised Grand Lodge. The best way to do this is to plan ahead and early, via an enquiry to the Provincial Office. Visit requests for a meeting "next week", or without specific dates in mind will have to take their turn in the queue of work and may not be reached in time... Please give the Provincial Office as much notice as possible and be as specific as you can! Wherever you are travelling to, you will need your Grand Lodge Certificate and clearance certificates to show you are in good standing.

The first thing to remember is that UGLE's protocol on visiting lodges abroad does not permit brethren to contact non-UGLE lodges directly - see "Information for Guidance of Members of the Craft" pg 6. It may seem tempting to save time and get in touch directly with a lodge in the town being visited which

has its own website (like our own lodge websites, there is usually a message of welcome to a prospective visitor and more often than not an email address or enquiry form), but so often this can be problematic. Firstly, because as mentioned above, it is a breach of masonic protocol. Secondly, because the Grand Lodge to which the lodge belongs may be irregular and unrecognised by UGLE. Lastly, because the Grand Lodge of which the lodge is a member may insist that

'their' protocol is followed, sending

the enquiry to the Grand

Chancellor's office at Great Queen Street, instead of replying direct. All three can lead to embarrassment and in certain cases, censure for the brother, who after all, only wanted a visit! This all sounds rather dramatic, so it may be easiest to give an example using one of our closest neighbours,

France, where UGLE recognises the National Grand Lodge of France/ Grande Loge Nationale Française ("GLNF") alone. Our example will be of a prospective visit from 'Brother John Bull' an imaginary member of the Province...

Bro Bull plans to be in Paris for a long weekend and decides to tack on an extra day for sightseeing. He arrives on Friday and plans to leave early on the following Tuesday. He calculates that he may be available to visit a lodge on the Monday evening.

1. He writes to the Province explaining this and asking if

there is a lodge that works in English meeting on the Monday

- 2 The Province checks with the Grand Chancellor's office which confirms that whilst there are several lodges meeting in French on the Monday, the only meeting in English in Paris is on the Saturday.
- The Province informs Bro Bull, who decides to change his schedule to go to the Saturday lodge, working in English
- 4. The Province relays this to the Grand Chancellor's office, which passes on Bro Bull's name and rank to the GLNF, who inform their Lodge Secretary in Paris.
- 5. GLNF simultaneously passes the meeting time and venue of the lodge to the Grand Chancellor's office, which writes to the Province giving these details
- The details are passed onto Bro Bull by the Province together with a reminder that he will need to take a clearance certificate from his lodge(s) together with his Grand Lodge Certificate.

This latter point is an important one. It is not normal for Entered

Apprentices or Fellow Crafts to travel as they do not have a Grand Lodge Certificate, but some Grand Lodges will accept a visit if the brother's desire to travel is supported by his lodge, or he is accompanied by a more established brother and he has a letter of endorsement from the Provincial office.

> 'Group' visits (by which a group of masons will travel from Suffolk to an overseas Grand Lodge) are also increasing in popularity. The process is largely the same, except that one brother should act as the "arranger" on behalf of his brethren, providing a list of those attending with their clearance certificates. With this sort of group, it is essential that plenty of notice is given. Imagine what your own Lodge

Secretary might say if he was approached, without notice, by a party of 20 visitors - especially if the visitors

wished to dine!

Lastly, a guick word on visiting the Grand Lodges of Ireland and Scotland - collectively known with UGLE as the Home Grand Lodges. Visits to Irish lodges follow the same procedures as us. For Scotland, by specific request of their Grand Secretary's office, all visitors should be notified in advance. Thus, if a visit to a Scots lodge is planned, whether individually or in a group, a note to the Province requesting the visit should be made in advance. This will be forwarded to the Grand Chancellor's team who will get the written approval for the visit from the Grand Lodge of Scotland and send that back to the Provincial Office, who will pass that on to you.

We hope you have fun - happy visiting!


Suffolk Installed Masters Lodge and The Medical Detection Dogs Charity



I was born in 1968 and raised in Colchester. I left school in 1984 and completed apprenticeships in carpentry and joinery and decided to work in the family industry, as a funeral director, and although it



was very rewarding, after a year I wanted to try something a bit different. I became a safety inspector and engineer of sports equipment in schools. This role took me all over the world and gave me great experience for what was to come.



Dear Companions,

November sees the installation of our new PGM and MEGS W. Bro Jolyon Berry. Planning for the ceremony is well progressed and it promises to be a wonderful day. This will be very much a joint effort with the various provincial DCs and Stewards of both craft and chapter working together to ensure that both the ceremonies and the festive board are a success.

In May Ex. Comp Nigel Gregory and I joined the RA rulership team and Ex Comp Roger Young was promoted to Second Grand Principal. In November we will have our new MEGS. So, quite a few changes but please be reassured that we are all very much focussed on ensuring that the great traditions of RA Masonry, and, in particular, Suffolk RA Masonry, are maintained and upheld. I can offer this reassurance not least because of the wonderful team of active officers that we are blessed with and who bring such experience and continuity to their roles but also because of the fantastic support we all have received from the companions throughout the province.

We have a lot to look forward to, but before I review the future, I would like to touch on why we are so well placed. We can look back over the last 10 years as being a wonderful time for the Royal Arch in Suffolk much of that due to the brilliant leadership of Ex. Comp David Boswell. I know that he's still very busy with other Masonic duties but he has reassured me that I can lean on him for advice and support. I am also pretty sure that the MEGS designate has his number on speed dial - we won't let him escape that easily.

Our retiring MEGS Ex comp Ian Yeldam had the frustrating misfortune of taking over just as Covid struck but thankfully the difficult task of trying to 're-boot' both Craft and Chapter after nearly 18 months of inactivity was made that much easier by the tireless work of his Deputy Grand Superintendent Ray Pascoe. Ray is passionate about the Royal Arch, about the history of our ritual but above all about the success of the Suffolk Province. We have much to thank him for.

I am sure that you are all aware that the Pro Grand Master has launched a strategy that will impact on us all, both as Brethren and Companions, but I am very hopeful that it will be of particular benefit to the Royal Arch. I would stress that the strategy is not about having change imposed on us, rather it is about developing a framework to help us reflect on what we do well and plan how we can exploit these positives to be better still. Of course, reflection might also expose weaknesses but I prefer to call them opportunities - opportunities to make small changes for the better. Above all though, any changes that we make will be our changes.

In RA we have one great asset - our magnificent ceremony - so let us exploit this wonderful gift. Let's explore how we can give our candidates the best masonic experience. It's our most important sale's pitch.

A good ceremony doesn't happen by chance and we all need to be prepared to play a part delivering success. The chapter PCs can help by forward planning - giving companions time to prepare for the ceremony and chapters time to rehearse. As individual companions, we can play our part by supporting our chapter DCs - when we get that call. The Province can play its part too - there are active officers and many other experienced companions happy to volunteer if asked - so please reach out to the Province if support is needed.

We don't need to be perfect, and we might even read a little, but, in my experience the happiest companions are those who tried their best. And happiness is contagious. So, we don't expect faultless ceremonies but rather happy ceremonies, they are the greatest masonic experience: they bring back the buzz and they bring back the visitors.

Those of you familiar with the strategy will also be aware of its emphasis on "yes, if" - i.e., being open to new ideas. I am sure that best ideas and initiatives come not from the rulers but from the wider membership - so the job of the provincial executive is to listen. Therefore, I am pleased to announce that we will be holding a Provincial Chapter Seminar at the start of 2024. We hope that we can encourage companions and in particular chapter DCs/ADCs to share their own experiences and examples of successful practice. More details to follow.

Finally, the strategy stresses the importance of having a seamless link between Craft and Chapter it seems to me to that we have lots to gain from working more closely with the Craft: It helps to raise the profile of RA in a Craft setting; brethren become more familiar with the order and are more likely to see joining Chapter as a natural progression rather than a step into the unknown.

• So, lots of food for thought but opportunities for every companion to help shape a successful future.

I will be out visiting again in the coming weeks and hope to see many of you on my travels, if not before then at Holbrook in November.

2023 a Memorable Year for a Remarkable Mason



Picture show the 3 PGMS of the Royal Order of Scotland Ralph Robertson, Alf Garner and John Robertson Alfred Edward Garner was born on 12 July 1923, was initiated into Jubilee Lodge No 5582 in Zambia on the 6 April 1953, becoming District Grand Master in February 1971. On his return to the United Kingdom, R.W.Bro. Alf eventually settled in Colchester Essex, where his commitment to all aspects of Freemasonry are legendary. He was Exalted into the Royal Arch, whist in Essex, in June 1955, eventually rising to PGSN (Eng) in 1983.

My personal connection with RWBro. Alf is through the Royal Order of Scotland. Bro. Alf was Advanced into the Order in Zambia on the 26 May 1973. On his return to Essex, Alf joined the Province of East Anglia in 1981. His administrative talents were soon recognised with his appointment to Provincial Grand Secretary, an Office he was holding when I was Advanced in 2005. Bro. Alf was Installed as Provincial Grand Master at Colchester in April 2007 by the then Head of the Order, the Earl of Elgin & Kincardine.

In April this year, the PGM for Essex, R.W.Bro. Paul Tarrant presented Bro. Alf with a 70 year Certificate to commemorate his membership of the Craft. This followed later with a 60 year Certificate in the Rose Croix.

The programme that we run has been perceived as being very beneficial to our Brethren and has without doubt saved a number of lives during the time it has been set up. Other Provinces are now seeking to establish their own programme and I have had a number of discussions with them to aid this to happen.

Until there is a National Testing Programme our type of testing is vital, make sure you attend one of our days and if you are in the programme already be aware of the advice given on what schedule of future tests you should be following. Please make use of one of the Test Days, it could save your life!

Forum caught up with our Chairman Jon Neill to ask some questions about our forthcoming Festival

What is a festival?

A festival is a fundraising appeal that is held to raise funds in support of the MCF. The festival consists of an 'appeal' and a 'finale'. During the appeal, members across the Province are encouraged to donate, raise funds, participate in events, learn about and promote the work of the charity, and join together for the benefit of the Province, the members and the MCF. The result of the appeal is celebrated at a final event where the total amount raised through donations is announced and the achievements and activities of the Province are celebrated.

A festival is very much a partnership with the MCF. Through participation in every aspect of the festival, the MCF aims to work with the Province to deliver a successful outcome.

What does Suffolk achieve from the Festival appeal ?

When we have a festival, we raise money for our own charity the MCF, we then receive this back in grants and support for our members and families, the amount we get back is normally more than what we raise.

How does Suffolk get this money back?

We receive this money back by the grants and support which is accessed through the Prov Charity Steward, the Prov Almoner or by direct contact with the MCF. See the MCF website for further information on grants.

When does our next festival start?

It will commence in January 2024 with an official opening event planned for Spring 2024, where any saved donations over the last 5 years can be given.

Can we pay money into the Festival29 relief chest now?

Yes, the Festival29 relief chest is now open, further details will be given on how to do this in the coming months.

When does the Festival finish?

It is planned to finish in Summer 2029 with an event where all will be welcome to celebrate our success.

Do we qualify for gift aid on our donations?

Yes, you can use the Festival relief chest then the gift aid is automatically paid in for you, straight into the relief chest.

Do we get interest on the money we donate?

Yes, if done via gift aid we can receive up to 6% back in interest making it better than any bank.

What happened to the old masonic charities?

They were all combined and now operate under one umbrella, our own charity the "MCF"

Where can we get more information about Festival29?



The importance of Festival appeals

The MCF is often faced with the misconception that additional donations are not needed due to the income it receives from its investments and the Annual Contribution. In reality, around 60 per cent of our income comes from the contributions of today's Freemasons, the majority of which is raised through festival appeals.

In 2019/20 the MCF spent over £36.2 million supporting individuals, families and charities, whereas the income received from investments amounted to only £7.44 million. This statistic clearly demonstrates that festivals are vital if the MCF is to continue its activities.

Orient take part in 40 mile Kayak Challenge

A £4,000 donation has been handed over to the Sandra Chapman Cancer Centre and Ward 17 at the James Paget Hospital after a 40-mile Kayak challenge undertaken by members of Lowestoft based Orient Lodge 4085.

Ian Moir, Chaplain of Orient Lodge, supported by lodge members of the Lowestoft Volunteer Lifeguard Corps and the Orient Lodge support team, undertook a 40-mile kayak paddle around Lowestoft, Gorleston and Burgh Castle in August 2022 to raise money for the centre.

Starting at the Lifeguards Lowestoft beach headquarters they headed up the coast to the mouth of the River Yare between Gorleston and Great Yarmouth before following the river inland to Burgh Castle and then taking the River Waveney via St Olaves, back through Oulton Broad to Lowestoft, completing the kayak paddle over the course of two days.



The route was designed to circle the James Paget hospital via the waterways which encircle the hospital.

Through sponsorship from local lodges and fundraising the team managed to raise a total of £4,000 to purchase two special treatment chairs, and on Thursday, 29 June, members of the lodge visited the James Paget centre to formally hand over the donation to staff at the Sandra Chapman Centre and Maxine Taylor, their hospital charity manager.

John Holland, one of the lodge members who was in the support team, said the fundraising had been a real team effort to raise money in memory of his wife Josie, who has since sadly passed away, and who had received treatment at the Centre and in Ward 17. The centre is treating many of the areas lodge members and families as well as the general public who suffer from this terrible disease.



New treatment for diabetes on the horizon

There will be hope for new treatments and better care for people with or at risk of diabetes, as PhD students receive a research grant of £315,000 from the MCF in partnership with Diabetes UK.

Over 4.9 million people in the UK are living with diabetes which, if untreated, can lead to health complications, like eye, foot or heart problems. Around 90 per cent of people with diabetes have type 2, and it is predicted that over 850,000 people have type 2 diabetes and are unaware of it. The series of research by the PhD students aimed to improve the treatment and diagnosis of different forms of diabetes, and protect people with the condition from its long-term complications, tackle some of the problems that diabetes can cause and improve the lives of many living with the condition.



Oliver Richards at Swansea University looked to improve the screening process for a type of diabetes that can develop during pregnancy, called gestational diabetes. Gestational diabetes occurs when pregnancy hormones make it hard for the body to use insulin properly, resulting in high blood sugar levels. While gestational diabetes usually goes away after giving birth, it can increase risk of type 2 diabetes in later life. Current screening for this form of diabetes is time-consuming and expensive, as mothers must fast overnight and be in hospital for several hours.

Oliver worked with Professor Thornton to develop a quicker, cheaper and more informative test for expecting mothers. This could reduce the time and cost of diagnosis, allowing the NHS to screen more pregnant women who are more likely to be at risk for gestational diabetes.

This research found that the new test works effectively with a non-invasive finger prick blood test, which is less invasive for the mother and easier to administer for hospital staff, making the testing process more time and cost effective. Moreover, this new method could provide further health information that could help to decrease the risk of pregnant women developing type 2 diabetes in later life.

"We're really pleased to be in partnership with Diabetes UK, who are the leading charity in the UK for people living with diabetes. The Suffolk Resilience Forum



Jamie Gwatkin, Provincial Grand Almoner and Jon Neill our Provincial Grand Charity Steward delivered a presentation to the Suffolk Resilience Forum (SRF) in Ipswich on Wednesday 16th August 2023. The objective of the meeting was for SRF to liaise with the Voluntary Sector in Suffolk and build on the positive experiences/relationships during covid to enhance the performance of the Tactical Coordination Group (TCG) in peacetime and during critical incidents.

Providers included many emergency organisations from RNLI, British Red Cross/St Johns Ambulance, ReAct Suffolk (Disaster Response), Search & Rescue/Suffolk Lowland Rescue/Search & Rescue Dog Association/Norfolk & Suffolk 4x4 Response/Felixstowe Coastal Patrol, Community Action Suffolk/Community Together, Eastern Region Counter-

terrorism advisory Group, FareShare (Food Pantries), Victim Support, and Salvation Army.



Their presentation was well received and they were very positive about what Freemasonry could do to assist in peacetime and during a critical incident. Suffolk Freemasons have now been invited to be part of a new group "Voluntary **Organisation Emergency** Support Group" which will report to the Collaborative

Communities Board (CCB) which co-ordinates emergency response throughout Suffolk.

This will significantly advance our involvement in the Community in Suffolk, and enable us to be viewed as an important link in the County infrastructure.

We also had two other positives – one potential initiate for a Woodbridge Lodge and a request from the Norfolk & Suffolk NHS co-ordinator to rent our Masonic Halls for training conferences.

Suffolk Learning & Development

In the last few months, the Provincial Learning & Development Team has organised three online study circle meetings, which have proven to be very informative and interesting to Suffolk Masons, regardless of their experience. All these meetings were held over "Zoom" and were scheduled for

Also, in November, the L&D Team has planned to organise an in-person session for important lodge members. The session will take place at three venues yet to be confirmed. The Masonic Knowledge and Understanding sessions will offer guidance on improving Masonic knowledge within each lodge through presentations and workshops. Further information regarding the event will be shared in due time.
